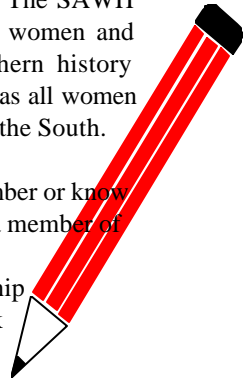

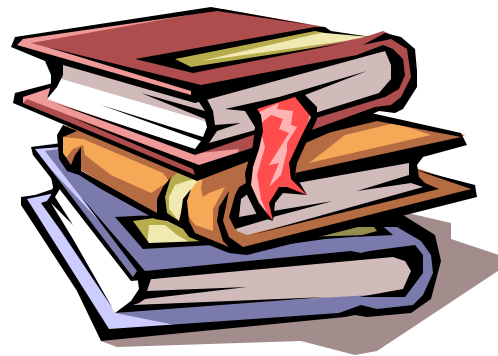

The SAWH invites all friends and sponsors to this year's Annual Address, given by Marjorie Julian Spruill of Vanderbilt University. Spruill is the author of *New Women of the New South: The Leaders of the Woman Suffrage Movement in the Southern States* (Oxford University Press) and *One Woman, One Vote: Rediscovering the Woman Suffrage Movement* (NewSage Press), and has co-edited numerous projects in southern and southern women's history, including *The South in the History of the Nation* (Bedford/St-Martin's) and *Mississippi Women: Their Histories, Their Lives* which will be published this fall with the University of Georgia Press. In "Countdown to Houston," Spruill will discuss the subject of her new book project, the 1977 International Women's Conferences and their significance. These conferences, involving over 300,000 women and men, were funded by Congress seeking women's views on how the federal government could make this a better society for women. There were conferences in each state and territory, culminating in a major National IWY Conference in Houston, Texas in November 1977. Spruill sees these conferences as key to understanding the cultural conflict between feminists and antifeminists and the rise of social conservatism in American politics in the 1970s, as well as the larger question of the role of gender issues in the "right turn" in American politics in the late 1970s.

Best Article Prize: The Society for Historians of the Gilded Age and Progressive Era (SHGAPE) announces its biennial competition for the best published article by a new scholar dealing with any aspect of United States history between 1865 and 1917. The article must have appeared in a journal dated 2001 or 2002. Any graduate student or individual with a doctorate awarded after 1992 who has not yet published a book is eligible to compete for a \$500 award. An article may be submitted for consideration by the author or by others (e.g., a journal editor). Deadline is December 1, 2003. Submit three copies of the article plus a copy of the table of contents of the issue in which it appeared. Questions and submissions should be directed to: Jacqueline M. Call For Papers: 47th Annual Missouri Valley History Conference, Omaha, Nebraska, March 4-6, 2004

Proposals for panels or individual papers in all areas of history, including public history, are welcome for the 47th annual Missouri Valley History Conference. Proposals, consisting of abstract(s), and one-page vitae, should be sent by October 15, 2003 to the program coordinator, Professor Tom Buchanan, Missouri Valley History Conference, Department of History, University of Nebraska at Omaha, Omaha, NE 68182. The conference email is mvhc@unomaha.edu. A prize of \$200 will be awarded to the best graduate student paper presented at the conference.

2004 OAH Lerner-Scott Dissertation Prize: The Lerner-Scott Dissertation Prize was given for the first time in 1992 for the best doctoral dissertation in U.S. Women's History. The prize was named for Gerda Lerner and Anne Firor Scott, both pioneers in women's history and past presidents of the Organization of American Historians.

A dissertation must be completed during the period 1 July 2002 through 30 June 2003 to be eligible for the 2004 Lerner-Scott Prize. Each application must contain a letter of support from a faculty member at the degree-granting institution, along with an abstract, table of contents, and sample chapter from the dissertation. Please include email addresses for both the applicant and the adviser, if available. One complete copy of each entry must be received by each member of the prize committee by 1 December 2003. Finalists will be asked to submit a complete copy of the dissertation at a later date.

The winner of the prize will receive \$1,000 and a certificate. The prize will be presented at the 2004 annual meeting of the OAH in Boston, Massachusetts, 25-28 March. One copy of each entry, clearly labeled "2004 Lerner-Scott Dissertation Prize," must be mailed directly to:

Authors of essays, publishers, or editors of journals, anthologies, or scholarly works containing independent essays are invited to submit for consideration essays or articles published between September 1, 2002 and August 31, 2003. Searching for Their Places

Women in the South across Four Centuries

*Edited by Thomas H. Appleton Jr.
and Angela Boswell*

Searching for Their Places is a collection inspired by the Fifth Southern Conference on Women's History. The essays in this volume are particularly astute in assessing how southern women, in the course of "searching for their places," have individually or collectively sought to empower themselves. The essays, written by outstanding historians in this field, represent some of the freshest and most exciting scholarship about women in the South. They convincingly illustrate how the national experience looks different when southern women become the focus.

The essayists use extensive analyses of primary source materials to examine a variety of issues that have confronted women in the South from the days of English colonization through the civil rights struggles of the post-World War II era. The collection is well balanced in its periodization, with one essay on the seventeenth century, four on the antebellum years, one on the Civil War, three on the immediate postbellum era, and four based in the twentieth century.

Studying women of different colors, backgrounds, and stations across the region and across four centuries, *Searching for Their Places* will appeal to historians, the general reader, and anyone interested in women's studies.

THOMAS H. APPLETON JR. is Professor of History at Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond, Kentucky. He is the coeditor of several books, including *Negotiating Boundaries of Southern Womanhood: Dealing with the Powers That Be* (University of Missouri Press).

ANGELA BOSWELL is Associate Professor of History at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas. She is the author of *Her Act and Deed: Women's Lives in a Rural Southern County, 1837-1873*.

Karen Kossie-Chernyshev (*Texas Southern University*) has been elected to a five-year term on the editorial board of the Society of Pentecostal Studies. She will spend the 2003-2004 academic year at Oberlin College as Visiting Assistant Professor of History and Religion. She was awarded a research grant from the Ottis Lock Endowment Committee (East Texas Historical Association) for her project "Mapping the Early Missionary Impulse of African-American Pentecostals in the Southwest." Shirley W. Moore (*Texas Southern University*) is the chair of the Department of English and Foreign Languages at Texas Southern University. She has also been elected a member of the faculty senate.

Barbara J. Rozek (*Independent Scholar*) teaches Advanced Placement U.S. History at Taylor High School in Houston, Texas. In the summer of 2003, Texas A & M University Press published her book, *Come to Texas: Enticing Immigrants, 1865-1915*. The book focuses on the advertisements, newspaper articles, private letters, and government efforts in the late nineteenth century that encouraged people to move to Texas.
