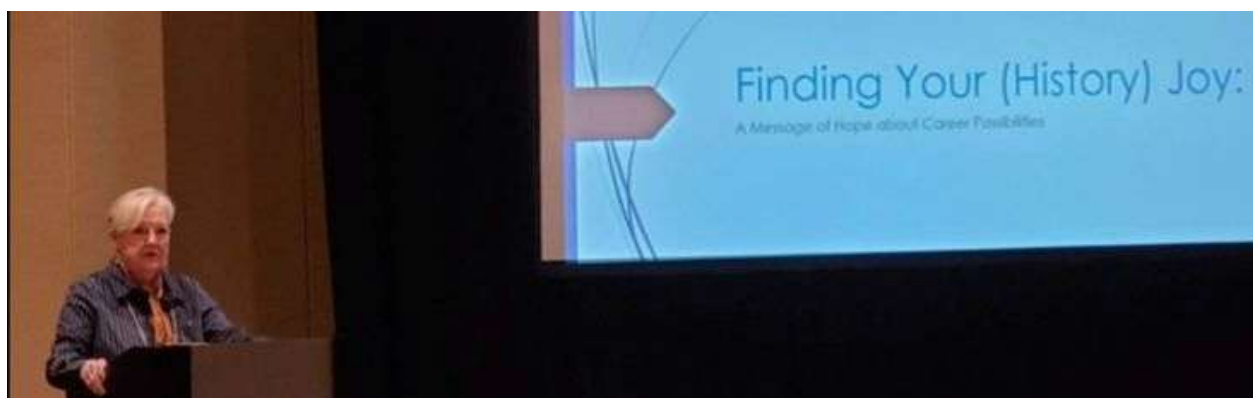

Janet Allured, University of Arkansas Department of History alumna and instructor, won the McGinty Lifetime Meritorious Service Award from the Louisiana Historical Association on March 22, 2024. The award, which is the highest honor given by the association "is awarded annually to recognize members of the Louisiana Historical Association who, over the length of their careers, have made significant contribution to scholarship in Louisiana history, to the historical profession in Louisiana broadly speaking, and/or to the Association specifically." The award recognizes Allured as both an expert in Louisiana history and one of the leading lights of the historical profession. The presenter of the award, Elaine Thompson from Louisiana Tech University, said "her research has focused on women in Louisiana and in the South, and has ranged across time, race, class, source materials, and presentation formats." "This illustrious award celebrates Dr. Allured's incredible career and honors her influence on the field, which serves our Department's mission," said Caree Banton, chair of the Department of History at Arkansas. Janet Allured recently retired from the Department of History at McNeese State University and returned to Fayetteville where she fills her retirement by writing and teaching in

the Department of History. As the author or editor of half a dozen books, with another under contract, she has made innumerable contributions to Louisiana history. Her most recent book, Remapping Second-Wave Feminism: The Long Women's Rights Movement in Louisiana, 1950-1997, is an outstanding example of her groundbreaking work. Her latest book, co-edited with M. Kathryn Armistead and due out in April from University Press of Florida, is Southern Methodist Women and Social Justice: Interracial Activism in the Long Twentieth Century.

Kathryn Beasley's book, The Proof Is in the Dough: Rural Southern Women, Extension, and Making Money, was published on January 15 by UGA Press. The *Library Journal* gave it a starred review and called it a "don't miss book," while *The Red & Black* newspaper at the University of Georgia listed it as one of the "seven books to read in 2025."

Evan Bennett (Florida Atlantic University) was awarded the silver medal in Florida Non-fiction from the Florida Book Awards for his book Tampa Bay: The Story of an Estuary and Its People (University Press of Florida, 2024).

Emily Bingham (Bellarmine University) wrote that, "Handing off the SAWH presidency to the marvelous Michelle Haberland in January brought relief but also reflection on how lucky I've been to work with many of you in the past year. A new research project on the history of study abroad has meant a lot of ILL reading, and I'm teaching a community-engaged class focusing on two Louisville, KY neighborhoods. Attending and presenting at the AHA in January was a pleasure and I can't wait to see everyone in June in Daytona Beach."

Victoria Bynum's (University of Texas, San Marcos) new book, Deep Roots, Broken Branches: A History Memoir, was released on February 17, 2025, by the University Press of Mississippi.

Marissa DeVelvis's (Augusta University) book, Gendering Secession: White Women and Politics in South Carolina, 1859-1861, will be available for purchase from Cambridge University Press in March.

Jesse George-Nichol's first book, Conservative Americanism: Nativism, Unionism, and Slavery in Border South Politics, 1854-1861, was published in December as part of Lexington Books' New Studies in Southern History Series, edited by John David Smith.

Elizabeth Gritter, Associate Professor of History at Indiana University Southeast in New Albany, Indiana, was one of twenty women nominated and selected from her campus to attend the conference of the American Council on Education Women's Network Indiana in Indianapolis in February. She plans to attend.

Rachel Gunter was invited to give the 2024-2025 Ballenger Lecture at Northeastern State University in Oklahoma. She will be presenting "Suffragists, Soldiers, and Immigrants: Drastic Changes to Voting Rights in the Progressive Era."

Brenda Lakhani (University of Texas, Dallas) wrote, “I am honored to announce I have been selected to participate in the Indigenous-focused workshop at the University of Colorado Boulder during the summer 2025.”

Stephanie Opperman (Professor of History, Georgia College & State University) recently published her monograph Cold War Anthropologist: Isabel Kelly and Rural Development in Mexico with the University of Arizona Press. <https://uapress.arizona.edu/book/cold-war-anthropologist>

She has also been named to the Board of Scholar Advisors to South Carolina Sestercentennial Commission (SC250), an organization planning programming, public history initiatives, and commemorations that highlight South Carolina's essential contributions to the Southern Campaigns of the American Revolution. Through Heyday Coaching, Melissa continues her work on leadership, career, and personal development with faculty and academic administrators.

Calls for Proposals

- History of Education Society Annual Meeting: The 2025 Program Committee for the History of Education Society invites proposals for its annual conference, which will be held in Providence, Rhode Island. The 2025 conference theme is Freedom to Teach; Freedom to Learn. **Deadline: March 17.**
- Codebreakers and Groundbreakers: Women's Work in the Second World War: The organizers invite submissions for fifteen-minute papers on women's work during the Second World War from students currently enrolled in any postgraduate program. **Deadline: March 21.**

- [Civil War Era Article Workshop](#): The Richards Center at Penn State and The Journal of the Civil War Era (JCWE) announce a journal article workshop for advanced graduate students, recent PhDs, assistant professors, and independent scholars. Selected scholars will provide a draft journal article by August 15, 2025, and participate in an online workshop in September. **Deadline: April 1.**
